## MARRIAGE BY BANNS OR COMMON LICENCE

Couples wishing to be married by ecclesiastical preliminaries of either banns or common licence <u>must</u> provide original identification documents to the member of the clergy or the person with authority to grant a common licence.

The checklist below is to be used for all marriage services taking place after 2 March 2015.
